Neoliberal policies promoted by governments and the World Bank to eradicate poverty and promote sustainable development have undermined the capacity of indigenous communities to safeguard their way of life and culture.

International charters and national legislation fail to protect the rights of indigenous communities, while asymmetries of power have contributed to the creation of a "new poor" and growing degradation of the environment.
