Established in 1996, the Australian Indigenous Law Review (formerly the Australian Indigenous Law Reporter) is a bi-annual, peer-reviewed publication of the Indigenous Law Centre, University of New South Wales. Publishing a broad range of commentary on legal issues affecting Indigenous peoples in Australia and around the world, the Review provides a platform for academic and political debate and aids conceptual developments in Indigenous law. The reputation of the Australian Indigenous Law Review is strengthened by its close ties with an Editorial Panel comprising a number of Australia's foremost experts on Indigenous law.

For Volume 15(1), the *Australian Indigenous Law Review* will publish a thematic edition focusing on the Royal Commission Into Aboriginal Deaths In Custody, 20 years on. The project is being run in association with the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander legal services. We are seeking expressions of interest for pieces which address a variety of issues, including retrospective analysis of the implementation of the recommendations, gender concerns, over-representation in the criminal justice system, and the possibilities and expectations stemming from the recommendations going into the future.

While the Australian Indigenous Law Review is an academic publication, its readership also includes Australian and international legal practitioners, government departments, Indigenous organisations and a range of NGOs. The Review publishes articles not only by lawyers, judges and legal academics, but also by political theorists, sociologists, educators, economists, medical practitioners, historians and philosophers. We are always looking for new and different perspectives on issues and debates in Indigenous law, and we encourage interdisciplinary

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submissions. Both solicited and unsolicited submissions are welcome, and Indigenous authors are particularly encouraged to submit.

200-word expressions of interest: due 15 January 2010

Completed manuscripts: due 1 May 2010

Commentary articles should generally be 5,000–15,000 words in length (including references), although submissions falling outside these limits may still be considered.
